

## DETAILS OF LISTED MONUMENTS & MAUSEOLEUMS



#### **BROWN MAUSOLEUM**

ROGER BROWN (d.1902), was a Trowbridge Clothier, and the donor of Trowbridge Town Hall. The original bronze gates of the mausoleum were reported stolen in 2012.



## **CLARK MONUMENT**

THE CLARK FAMILY were wealthy clothiers, who owned Stone Mill. Maj. Thomas Clark built St. Thomas's Church, in memory of his father.



KINGSTON & HASTINGS MAUSOLEUM

THE REV. J.D. HASTINGS (d.1860) was the Rector of Trowbridge, and built the Alms House on Union Street. His connection with Rev. Thomas Kingston, originally of Dublin, is not recorded.



## TAYLER MONUMENT

GEORGE CHRISTOPHER TAYLER (d.1912), was the Medical Officer to the Melksham and Trowbridge Union; he worked at the Cottage Hospital and was the Churchwarden at St Thomas's Church.



## KEMP MONUMENT


**JOHN KEMP**, Trowbridge Clothier (d.1896), was a partner in Kemp & Hewitt, owners of Innox Mill, later the site of Bowyers Factory.



## **RODWAY MAUSOLEUM**

There seems to be no record of the incumbent of this mausoleum. It may be the solicitor, **ROWLAND RODWAY**, whose father built Adcroft House (c.1853), which later became the Trowbridge Hospital.

# Wildlife in the Cemetery

We have also started transcribing details from the Burial Books which are held in the Swindon & Wiltshire Records Office. If you are interested in helping with this part of the project, please contact robertw@fotdc.org.

This can be done when you have the time, and does not need to be done on scheduled workdays. I am happy to meet you at the cemetery or the Records Office to help you get started. We will provide you small sections of dates to be completed, and I will show you where the information is.

We are also starting a project on the servicemen buried in the war graves, as well as those who are remembered on civilian gravestones and monuments.
