Welcome to all members old and new.

I was concerned that after having nearly a whole year without the Friends being able to meet, that membership would have declined. How wrong I was. Our membership has increased and already since lockdown has eased, we have managed 118 hours of work at the cemetery. So, a **BIG** thank you to you all.

Following on from my last ramblings, we did manage to complete the restoration of the two pre-WW1 graves. We have also arranged to assist Trowbridge Royal British Legion with the placing of the Poppy crosses on all the war graves.

During my research we have found several graves where families have added memorials to loved ones that they lost in combat. I have also found some graves for the fallen that are not marked - all these will have a poppy this year. This research is ongoing so more will be added. I will notify you all when we will be placing these crosses and anybody that wishes to join us will be welcome.

Already this year we have put in two bids for funding. The first to Wiltshire Council is to replace bird feeders and nest boxes that have been damaged by squirrels and woodpeckers. The second is to the Co-op so that we can build the pollination corridor.

This year's goals will be to continue painting the railings and gates (if you have not seen what we are doing take a look), transcribe the headstones on the conformist side of the cemetery.



I have nearly completed the burial records for the nonconformists, this should be completed later in the year. At long last, we have been given permission to plant fruit trees near Roger Brown's mausoleum, so hopefully we can do this in the autumn. And of course, continue to clear graves of brambles and ivy.

Looking forward to the year ahead and see you all soon.

We few, we happy few, we band of brothers...

Sergeant Wilfred Jeffery Baker Service Number 10432 1st Bn Wiltshire Regiment

Wilfred was the second son of William and Annie Baker of 15, Avenue Road, Trowbridge.

He was a pupil at Newtown School and won a county scholarship, continuing his education at the Secondary School.

On leaving school he was employed by Mr Ledbury, before working for the county council land agents.

Wilfred volunteered for service on the 1st September 1914.



He was wounded on August Bank Holiday 1915, near Dickebusche, Belgium, having been shot in the arm. Wilfred was then evacuated to England, first being sent to Brighton Hospital and then on to Wingfield House Red Cross Hospital.




After being in service for four years Wilfred was struck down with influenza which developed in pneumonia. He died on Saturday 7th December 1918 at the military hospital in Aylesford Kent aged 24.

His body was brought home to Trowbridge where he was buried with full military honours.

Not Only in Stone



Back in the autumn of 2017 we wrote in our newsletter, that we were uncertain of the reason that the Kingston and Hastings family were buried together in the mausoleum. Well thanks to John Antill who wrote to me, he has come up with the solution whilst researching his family tree.

The Rev J. D. Hastings wife was Ellen (née Dobbs) (1806-1885, daughter of (Thomas) Henry Dobbs (1775-1843)

The Rev Thomas Kingston married (first wife) Ellen's sister Elizabeth (1802-1833) Both the reverends attended and graduated from Trinity College, Dublin in the early 1820's.

The following people are buried in the mausoleum.

Nature's Corner

Tawny Owl Strix Aluco Syluatica



Description

Length 15-19 inches, wingspan 27-41 inches, lifespan up to 10 years.

Most birds belong to a greyish type, streaked, mottled, and barred with various shades of Brown. Underparts dull white, with dusky streaks and paler bars, wings, and tail brown. The female is larger than the male.

Distribution

Resident almost throughout Europe except Iceland, Ireland, and Scandinavia. In all kinds of woodland and wooded areas, such as farmland with tall hedges and trees. Can be

heard hooting most of the year.

Nesting

The normal site of the nest is a natural hole in a tree, sometimes uses old nest of Rooks or Crows. No nesting material is used.

2-4 eggs that are white, smooth, and somewhat round in shape, incubation is between 29-30 days and only one brood between April and June.

Food

Drops down to take Voles, mice, rats, frogs, beetles, and earthworks from the ground. Also, will occasionally catch small birds.

Fun Fact

We do have a nest box at the cemetery, but it has yet to be occupied by an owl, although I have seen squirrels in it.



Nature's Corner

Wild Rabbit Orytolagus Cuniculus

Description

Male (buck) and female (doe) generally measure 40-45 cm long and have 8.5cm, long ears. They have compact bodies with long, powerful hind legs. Fur is grey/brown in colour with white underparts with a short tail. Life span can be up to 9 years.

Distribution

Widespread across the whole of the United Kingdom. In the 1950's the disease Myxomatosis was introduced to curb their numbers, nearly making them extinct. They have now recovered and again have become a serious pest for farmers, eating and damaging crops.



Feeding

Rabbits are herbivores who feed mainly on grass but will eat vegetables and crops. They re-swallow up to 80% of their faeces to use their food more efficiently, in a process known as refection. Rabbits graze heavily and rapidly for roughly the first hour, followed by about half an hour of more selective feeding.

Reproduction

Rabbits generally are able to breed at a young age and may produce litters of up to seven young, often doing so four or five times a year, due to the fact that a rabbits gestation period is only 28 to 31 days.

New-born rabbits are naked, blind, and helpless at birth, but mothers are remarkably inattentive. To overcome this lack of attention the milk is highly nutritious and among the richest of all the mammals. The young grow rapidly and are weaned in about a month.



Fun Fact.

At the cemetery, you can find plenty of evidence of rabbits, but still yet to see any.
